Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, 1756-1791. Arranged by Julian Phillips Fantasia in F minor, K.608

Composed the year Mozart died, the Fantasia in F minor, K. 608 was originally written for a large table clock that included a small mechanical organ. Operating on a similar system to a music box, a piece of music could be programmed to play on the organ at specific times. Today's concert features an arrangement for wind quintet by British composer Julian Phillips.

James MacMillan, b.1959

'Untold was commissioned by the Ayr Arts Guild for the Flaxton Ensemble who gave the premiere in 1987. It is a short, slow movement for wind quintet but using a cor anglais instead of an oboe. Its mood is lyrical and expressive, the material being loosely based on an Irish love-song: For Ireland I'll not tell her Name.' James MacMillan.

A number of preoccupations thread through John Woolrich's varied output, including a fascination with machinery and mechanical processes, and his Book of Studies Set 1 is an apt companion piece to the Mozart Fantasia. Written in 1993 for young musicians from the Royal Academy of Music Junior Department, there are six short movements with explanatory titles.

Monody, style of accompanied solo song consisting of a vocal line, which is frequently embellished, and simple, often expressive, harmonies.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, 1756-1791 Divertimento No.1 in B flat major K. Anh. 229 (439b)

It's not known when Mozart wrote his Five Divertimenti for three basset horns; the autograph is lost and Mozart did not enter the work into his personal catalogue but there is no doubt about Mozart's authorship. The complete edition of these works was first published in the early 1800s, arranged for two clarinets and bassoon as trios for basset horns were rare by then. These Divertimenti went on to become incredibly popular, available, as they were, in numerous editions and in arrangements for a variety of instrumental combinations.

Leoš Janáček, 1854-1928 Mládí

I. Andante II. Moderato III. Allegro IV. Con moto

Janáček wrote his 'Youth Suite' at the ripe old age of 70. He'd heard the Parisian ensemble 'Societe modern des instruments a vent' several times in Salzburg and Brno and expanded the classic quintet scoring with the addition of a bass clarinet. The composer refers to earlier years in his life, quoting a theme from 'March of the Bluebirds', referring to the light blue robes worn by the choristers at the monastery in Brno which Janáček entered at the age of 11, and there's a general freshness of expression, too. The piece was enthusiastically received by critics and public alike and was first published in 1925.
